
A letter I wrote to the Editor of the *Daily Dispatch* [which was published on April 30, 2004] elicited an immediate, caring and warm-hearted response, with offers of help of whatever nature.

Thus it was that a nucleus of seven concerned East Londoners (including a lawyer and an accountant) was assembled with a view to forming a trust which would undertake to provide a full-time companion/care giver and to cover the cost of all her material needs for the rest of her life.

We had found that she was living very frugally on a small pension and, with increasing age and frailty, medical costs were quite beyond her savings – let alone certain home comforts which the average person might take for granted.

We had reached the point where an ideal person had been chosen to move into her home – and in fact had been to see the house and meet Marge's dog. And then the blow fell; Marge developed pneumonia, was admitted to hospital, and on the day that we were planning to tell her that everything was in

place for the great return home – she died. At least she knew that we were doing our best for her wish to be granted, because we had kept her informed of progress all along the way.
