We wish her well in her new life in the Cape.

Our Treasurer, Doug Sutherland, will present the Financials to you, but I should mention that the Committee has agreed to give R500 to Historic Bathurst to assist with repairs to the Mill and Powder Magazine which were recently vandalized. It doesn't sound much, but we are not a wealthy society.

We remember Frank Allison, Raymond Morgan, David Cunningham, Brian Aylward, Graham Dickason (past LAHS President & generous donor to LAHS), June Bell, Tony Mann, Merwynne Jones (past LAHS Hon Secretary, Chair, and avid researcher, especially on Bathurst), who passed away during the year and we extend our condolences to their families.

It only remains for me to thank the Committee for their moral support, for their enthusiasm and good humour during the (sometimes long) committee Zoom meetings, and for the hard work involved in the production of our journal, the Toposcope.

Even though we have had no meetings, we would like to thank Pat Bailes and Robin Collett who arrange and serve tea at our indoor meetings, and Ed Hosek and Val Williams of Settlers Park for their technical support. And of course, to Settlers Park for the use of the Don Powis Hall.
